Too Close for Comfort

Do you have a "close call" story? Maybe you narrowly missed hitting a deer on a dark road. Perhaps a big storm struck the area where you were vacationing the day after you went home. Or maybe you took an impromptu drive "just for the fun of it" only to find a large tree had fallen onto the driveway while you were out - right where your car was parked.

Close calls and near-misses happen everywhere in the workplace, at home, and on the road. Heinrich's Law, named after American engineer Herbert Heinrich, says that for every three hundred near-misses there are twenty-nine minor injuries and one serious injury or fatality. It is for this reason that near-misses - unplanned events that have the potential to cause damage, injury or death but for some reason don't - are tracked in many industries in order to identify and address potential hazards before they lead to injury or loss of life.

Motor vehicle towing and roadside service providers are at risk of being struck by passing motorists while they are working at the roadside. The Towing and Recovery Association of America, Inc., reports that nearly 30% of towing industry respondents reported encountering near-miss incidents every day. While rightly concerned about the danger, workers in this industry consider them just part of the job.

At present, efforts to protect this vulnerable group of road users are limited by a lack of comprehensive, high-quality data regarding these close calls. Data from near-miss incidents have been identified as a major gap towards a more robust understanding of risks faced by roadside response personnel and ways to protect them. Can we learn from other fields?

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) ensures safe and healthy working conditions for workers by requiring employers to maintain accurate records of all incidents that occur in the workplace, including near-misses.

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) track aviation near-misses. They investigate, determine the facts, identify probably causes, and make recommendations to prevent a recurrence.

The International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC) has the National Fire Near-Miss Reporting System to track and learn from voluntary and confidential near-miss reports from firefighters with the aim to prevent future injuries and fatalities on the job.

The AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety is working with researchers at the University of Alabama to identify the elements needed for a successful nearmiss reporting system for roadside responders.

This project will examine and document existing near-miss reporting systems used in other domains, such as firefighting and aviation, to inform the design of such a system for roadside responders. The project team will conduct interviews with developers or managers of existing reporting systems in order to identify the challenges, barriers, and opportunities to system development. Perceptions and attitudes regarding near-miss reporting will also be gathered from roadside workers through focus groups and surveys.

Collectively, these tasks will help the AAA project team assess the data needs associated with a nearmiss reporting system and to develop recommendations for a successful reporting system, from design through to deployment. Just as this type of investigation and preventive follow-through has helped other agencies to reduce circumstances that have the potential to cause injury or death to workers in their respective fields, the aim of this project is to better protect the workers at the core of our industry.








Improving Roadside Safety

If your car has ever broken down unexpectedly, you know how dangerous and unsettling it can feel to be stranded at the roadside as cars whizz past. Roadside technicians, police officers, firefighters, and rescue workers put themselves in harm's way to help people in that situation every day.

An average

of two roadside service providers are killed each month attend-



ing to disabled vehicles along America's roadways, and many more are injured.

To protect roadside workers and anyone else working or stranded at the roadside, AAA offers these tips: • Always remain alert. Avoid distractions and focus on driving.

• Watch for situations where emergency vehicles, tow trucks, utility service vehicles or disabled vehicles are stopped on the side of the road.

• Slow down when you see the flashing lights of an emergency vehicle at the roadside and, if possible, move over into an adjacent lane. If you are unable to switch lanes, slow to a speed that is safe and reasonable.



Boasting a bright red and blue frame, the new attraction towers 137 feet in The Hollow region of the largest amusement park in Pennsylvania. 

Everything Counts

Dear Ask Ed:

I took my car to get it inspected, and it failed for my bike rack! I've never had that happen before! What's going on! Am I being taken advantage of? I feel like I was ripped off. Can you help? Thank you. Angelica P.

Dear Angelica, Is your bike rack mounted on the back of your vehicle rather than on the roof? If so, the inspection station is correct if the carrier structure was partially or completely covering the vehicle's license plate (see photo below).

As I'm driving around Berks and beyond, I see so many vehicles that should have failed their safety or "state" inspection, as some folks call it, but there they are, driving along with a current sticker on the windshield. Someone isn't fully doing their job...

I'm going to take this opportunity to touch on some of what I see. I'm doing this because not only as an inspection mechanic but as a PennDOT Inspection Program Instructor, I'm hearing rumbles that PennDOT is cracking down on inspection stations that are passing vehicles that should not pass. The result should be more stations taking safety inspections seriously and making sure that their inspection techs are doing their jobs correctly so that they don't get cited or even shut down as a result of an infraction. Penalties range from warnings to permanent suspension from the inspection program for both the tech and the facility.

Safety inspections are conducted in accordance with Pennsylvania's Vehicle Equipment and Inspection Regulations Pub 45, the inspection tech's "Bible". If your bike rack obscured your license plate, the technician was correct because he was acting in accordance with Title 75 Section 1332.0 Display of Registration Plate, subsections (b) and (c). This would also include racks for scooters, camping equipment, etc. Certain license plate frames that obscure the top of the plate where it says "Pennsylvania" also cause the vehicle to fail the safety inspection, as well as tinted plate covers and registration numbers that are illegible at a reasonable distance.

Items hanging from a rearview mirror are also cause for failing the vehicle safety inspection because they create a blind spot for the driver. Same for baby booties, fuzzy dice, etc. Remember, a handicap parking placard should only be hung from the mirror after the driver has parked the vehicle and should be taken down and stowed away while the vehicle is in motion.

Other things I see going illegally down the road include aftermarket tail light covers, uncovered offroad

lighting, forward-facing lights that are colors other than white, and flashing brake lights. Brake lights per Pennsylvania Code must be steady burning. Sequential brake lights (i.e. on certain factory-equipped Ford Mustangs) are not considered flashing lights and pass.

Another common infraction that I see are tires whose tread sticks out beyond the vehicle body. This might not be the fault of the inspection mechanic, as I suspect that the vehicle owner switches out the illegal tires for those he/she knows will pass the inspection process. The truck gets a new sticker for another year, the legal-size tires go back in the corner of the garage and the big honking mudders get reinstalled, free to throw dirt, stones and other road debris unimpeded into the path and windshield of any following vehicles.

May is National Tourism Month, which coincides with National Travel and Tourism Week (NTTW), held the first full week of May. NTTW originated in 1983 by a congressional resolution to highlight the importance of travel and tourism to the U.S. economy and to our local communities.

Last year, Governor Shapiro launched a new PA State tourism brand - *Pennsylvania: The Great American Getaway* - to encourage millions of visitors within driving distance to travel to our state. Bringing visitors to Reading and Berks County to support the local economy is the mission of Pennsylvania's Americana Region (PAR), our local Visitors Bureau.

As explained by Heather Zimmerman, President/CEO, "We are the marketing force behind bringing in visitors to explore all we have to offer in Berks County. This helps create jobs, generates revenue for area businesses, as well as our local and state tax base. The close to \$1 billion in spending that tourism delivers to Berks County is a game-changer - and is perhaps an eye-opening statistic but one we are so proud of here at Pennsylvania's Americana Region."

Whether you are a new resident of Berks County or a visitor from outside the area, you will be curious to explore our local culture, history, and natural surroundings. In fact, 'Get Curious', the mantra of PAR, is branded visibly on its popular travel guide, available at AAA Reading-Berks, and other marketing for tours, trails, and road trips.

Berks County natives, many of whom have planted themselves here, can sometimes overlook what makes Reading and Berks County a desirable place to live, work, and explore. Our arts and culture; covered bridges and historic sites; historic railroads; festivals and fairs; trails, parks and scenic views; sporting venues; antiques and boutiques; farmers markets; restaurants, breweries and wineries attract tourists, preserve our county's identity, and contribute to our affordable cost of living.





A state report studying travel and tourism spending across Pennsylvania in 2022 revealed that visitors' direct spending in Berks reached \$983.2 million that year.

Smartphone Apps - Key to Safer Drivers?

In 2023, over 40,000 people died in motor vehicle crashes in the United States, fueled by risky behaviors like speeding, impairment, and aggressive driving. Although this number has decreased from previous years, it remains high compared to pre-pandemic levels, underscoring the need for innovative approaches to improve the safety of our nation's roads. AAA is committed to finding effective ways to encourage drivers to adopt safer behaviors behind the wheel and curb this unsettling trend.

"This research, with over 1,400 study participants, gauges what motivates individuals to change certain risky driving behaviors," said Dr. David Yang, president and executive director of the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety. "Finding ways to reduce these behaviors can positively impact traffic safety and reduce injuries and fatalities on our roads."

Research shows that speeding, aggressive driving, and distraction contribute to a significant number of crashes. Efforts to change these behaviors often involve driver education, public awareness, and legislation. While these approaches can be effective, they often require significant resources and time to yield results, and the crash trends suggest that additional countermeasures are also needed.

Smartphone technology enables the measurement of dangerous driving behaviors, which could pave the way for remedies to help drivers improve their safety. Interestingly, this may already be happening through usage-based insurance (UBI) programs, which are typically used by insurance companies to offer customers incentives for safe driving. However, it is challenging to determine whether UBI programs truly improve safety, as only individuals who opt in are monitored.

To explore this issue further, The AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety examined whether providing feedback and incentives—typical of UBI programs—enhances driver safety. Researchers also explored whether targeted goals, either assigned or selfselected, lead to greater improvements.

The trial examined the use of handheld phones, speeding, hard braking, and rapid acceleration. Participants were divided into four groups, with different levels of feedback and advice over a 12-week period. All groups, except the observation group, could earn bonus incentives based on their overall driving safety.

• **The Observation group** – served as the control; their driving was monitored during this period, but they received no feedback or bonus incentive.

The Standard Feedback group
 – given weekly feedback and advice via text messages on all behaviors monitored.

• The Assigned Goal group – focused on one specific behavior assigned to them and were given weekly feedback and advice via text messages on that one behavior.

• The Chosen Goal group – participants selected one behavior to focus on and set a goal for improvement; were given weekly feedback and advice via text messages on that goal.

The Results:

Among the three feedback groups, there were clear improvements in driver behavior:

Up to a 13% reduction in speeding

 \bullet Up to a 21% reduction in hard braking

• Up to a 25% reduction in rapid acceleration

Surprisingly, the use of handheld phones remained unchanged. It is

possible that the baseline safety scores provided to participants at the start of the study for this behavior led drivers to believe that they were being safer than they actually were—and therefore, there was less need for improvement.

Participants also reported how helpful the following tactics were in changing their behaviors:

• 67.4% - the potential to earn extra money

 53.9% - weekly driving feedback via text message


• 45.8% - weekly dashboard (provided detailed driving information for the week)

Participants in the "Assigned Goal" and "Chosen Goal" groups also displayed higher engagement with the dashboard, which correlated to greater improvement in risky driving behaviors.

After the 12-week period, participants were monitored for an additional 6 weeks without any feedback or incentives to determine if their habits would persist in the absence of reinforcement. The study found that, generally, participants continued to drive more safely, indicating that they did so without receiving feedback or incentives.

"It's encouraging to see that many individuals stuck with safer habits even after the study," said Jake Nelson, AAA's director of traffic safety advocacy. "This shows that positive reinforcement, not just punitive measures, can lead to safer driving habits that can save lives."

AAA's research shows that the kinds of feedback and incentives offered by UBI programs can improve driver safety across a range of behaviors. Developers of this technology can maximize the benefits of this tool by looking for ways to enhance participant engagement.



AAA Survey: Fear of Self-Driving Vehicles Persists

According to AAA's latest survey on autonomous vehicles, 13% of U.S. drivers would trust riding in self-driving vehicles – an increase from last year, when this number was 9%. Despite this slight increase, 6 in 10 U.S. drivers still report being afraid to ride in a self-driving vehicle. For drivers, enhancing vehicle safety systems remains a priority over the development of self-driving, with interest

among drivers decreasing from 18% in 2022 to 13% this year.

"Most drivers want automakers to focus on advanced safety technology," said Greg Brannon, the automotive

engineering director at AAA. "Though opinions on fully self-driving cars vary widely, it's evident that today's drivers value features that enhance their safety."

Improving safety systems is important for U.S. drivers—78% prioritize advancements in safety systems as a top vehicle technology initiative which has been steady for the past several years. In contrast, the excitement surrounding new vehicle styles is a low priority, with only 24% of drivers viewing it as important. Enthusiasm is also low toward the development of self-driving vehicles only 13% of drivers consider this a priority, a decrease from 18% in 2022.

As of 2025, Robotaxis, self-driving vehicles used like a taxi or rideshare, operate in several major cities. AAA's survey found that 74% of drivers were aware of Robotaxis, yet 53% said they would not choose to ride in one.

Different demographics have varying opinions. Millennial and Generation X drivers are more likely to say they would ride in a Robotaxi than Baby Boomer drivers, but even among younger drivers, most say they wouldn't ride in one.

Collectively, interest in advanced driver assistance features (ADAS) con-

tinues to remain high. The survey found that 64% of U.S. drivers would "definitely" or "probably" want Automatic Emergency Braking (AEB) on their next vehicle, 62% would want Reverse Automatic

Emergency Braking, and 59% Lane Keeping Assistance. AAA believes that to maintain a growing interest in these features, the performance and naming of these systems must adequately reflect the intended benefits and capabilities of the systems.

AAA believes addressing consumer concerns means transparency regarding ADAS performance with clear communication about its limitations. Advanced vehicle safety technology should enhance driver safety rather than give the impression that the car is driving itself. As these systems have been refined with upgraded software and sensors. AAA has conducted various tests to determine if the technology performs as expected. Research released by AAA in October 2024 showed significant AEB advancements, particularly at speeds up to 35 mph.

What is a Robotaxi?

A robotaxi is a self-driving car that operates as a ridesharing vehicle. Robotaxis are also known as driverless taxis, autonomous taxis, or robot taxis. (i.e., Waymo).

Would drivers ride in a Robotaxi?

Half of U.S. drivers would not ride in a Robotaxi if given the opportunity. The people who have more experience with them or know someone who has ridden in one are more likely to say they would ride in one (36%) than those who didn't have the exposure (15%).

What demographic is more likely to ride in a Robotaxi?

Different demographics have varying opinions about Robotaxis. Millennial (27%) and Generation X (23%) drivers are more likely to say they would ride in a Robotaxi than Baby Boomer (13%) drivers.
