President's Note

"...use your vehicle's high beams when the situation calls for it..."

Blinded by the Light

As sad as it is to admit, most of us have become used to dealing with distracted drivers, aggressive drivers, inconsiderate drivers and their ilk. AAA and many other traffic safety agencies continue our crusade to educate and engage the public about how to be safe roadway sharers. Much effort and significant resources continue to be dedicated to reducing injuries and death due to traffic crashes.

Despite year-round safe driving campaigns, we've now come to expect (and accept?) a dangerous annual "tradition" on the highways. Confused drivers surface during each holiday season - motorists who typically don't travel far from home during most of the year and are thus unfamiliar with environmental and traffic changes, so they drive slower, go the wrong way, and commit other potentially catastrophic driving errors.

While those seasonally bad drivers can be explained away, what is going on with the rest of us during the balance of the year? Have motorists in general just given up on driving sensibilities? Are we just throwing our hands in the air in surrender?

There are driving errors that are easier dealt with by fellow motorists than others. For instance, if a driver in front of you neglects to signal their intention to make a turn, you can avoid a crash if you are alert and can make a change in your speed and position. If an aggressive driver follows too closely, you can handle it by slightly reducing your speed to encourage him to go around you where it is safe (remember not to make eye contact or drive home if followed - call 911 if necessary).

Here's the issue I want to address - drivers who do not reduce their headlights from high beam to low beam for oncoming traffic.

It's not something that we've never had to deal with before - I'm sure that you as a driver have had this happen personally. The troubling concern is that it is happening with more and more frequency. And

there isn't much a driver can do when confronted with the blinding high beams of an oncoming car. Retaliating by bumping up your headlights may be what you want to do, but it is not the right thing to do. AAA suggests that you close one eye (assuming you have good vision in both eyes), focusing the open eye to the side of the road. After the danger passes, you now have one eye unaffected by the glare of the affronting driver's high beams.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, drivers have a 50 percent greater chance of crashing after the sun goes down without having to deal with other drivers' high beams. Combine that with Department of Transportation estimates that 85 percent of drivers misuse their high beams at some point and you have a recipe for disaster.

Not using high beams properly isn't just an unsafe and disrespectful thing to do to fellow roadway users, it is also dangerous to the offending driver. Using high beams to drive in poor weather such as fog or rain makes the driving task more difficult because the light will be reflected off the water particles, making it harder to see oncoming traffic, pedestrians, etc (Tyndall Effect - look it up).

It can also cause the driver to misjudge distance to the front of the vehicle. This is because the same aspect that blinds drivers of oncoming vehicles - the higher aim of the high beam lights - is designed to better illuminate the roadway and sides of the road (revealing animals, cyclists, pedestrians, etc) farther than the low beam aim can. Using your high beams when rounding a corner or when cresting a hill can cause you to misjudge the distance to the front of your vehicle and cause delayed braking, intersection and turning crashes.

Certainly, use your vehicle's high beams when the situation calls for it. But be aware and react appropriately when the situation calls for a change. I know I'll appreciate it, and so will everyone else.








Restored Carriage Factory Unveiled in Boyertown



The Boyertown Museum of Historic Vehicles has recently debuted a brand new permanent exhibit space—The Carriage Barn.

Attached to the 1872 Carriage Factory, which displays Boyertown-built carriages, a working blacksmith forge, and a functional belt-driven machine shop, the Carriage Barn features several showstopper vehicles in the Museum collection not built in Boyertown. Included is a restored huckster wagon built by the Hamburg Carriage Works, a predecessor of fire apparatus manufacturer Hahn Motors, and a pristine Wolfington Rockaway Carriage. Wolfington Body Company is still in business today in nearby Exton, Pennsylvania, specializing in school bus bodies. The Museum's restored English hearse, one of the most popular pieces with visitors, has also been moved out of the main gallery and into the Carriage Barn for permanent display.

Other Pennsylvania manufacturers featured in the Carriage Barn are John Yohn of Pottstown, Graves and Eighmy of Somerset County, and Daniel Wieand of Mauch Chunk (Jim Thorpe). Sleighs of different styles from these companies help illustrate the large variety of horse-powered transportation in the late 1800s and early 1900s.

Finally, the Museum is pleased to feature some new acquisitions in the Carriage Barn, including some not built in Pennsylvania. Their rarity, however, makes them truly stand out and worthy of display. A unique Skeleton Break, used to train and exercise carriage horses, takes center stage in the Carriage Barn. Truly a 'workhorse' of a vehicle, not many skeleton brakes from the late 1800s have survived to present day because of their hard, continuous use.

Also new to the Museum's collection is a Hansom Cab, a distinguished front-entry taxi cab, an original condition scallop sleigh by the famous Brewster & Company, and a Bavarian

State Coach built in 1856 for King Ludwig I and used by his fourth son, Prince Albert.

How did this piece of European royalty end up in the United States? Dieter Holterbosch, importer of Lowenbrau Beer, purchased it and other King Ludwig estate items and had it shipped to his home on Long Island in 1959. The carriage eventually ended up in the collection of the Smithsonian, which then graciously donated it to the Boyertown Museum of Historic Vehicles.





The Boyertown Museum of Historic Vehicles is a 501c3 nonprofit organization founded in 1965 by Paul and Erminie Hafer. The Museum, located at 85 South Walnut Street in Boyertown, Pennsylvania, preserves and displays examples of Pennsylvania's road transportation history in the former factory buildings of the Boyertown Auto Body Works. Over ninety locally manufactured cars, trucks, carriages, bicycles, and motorcycles are on display, as well as two examples of roadside architecture - a 1921 cottage-style Sunoco gas station and a 1938 Jerry O'Mahony diner.

The Museum, including the Carriage Barn, is open

seven days a week, 9:30am-4pm. Contribution rates are \$10 for adults, \$9 for seniors and AAA members, and ages 15 & under are free. For more information, call 610-367-2090 or visit www.boyertownmuseum.org.

Subaru Issue Follow-Up

Dear Ask Ed.

I am replying to "Battery Issue" column from the Jan/Feb 2024 issue of On the Go.

I am the owner of 2016 Subaru Outback that I bought new from our local Subaru dealership. I went through 4 batteries in the span of a few months. I was fortunate that AutoPro in Shillington stayed with me through this nightmare.

When there was nothing more they could do they recommended I take the car to the Subaru dealership. There, they found that the DCM unit had gone bad; so they replaced it and assured me that the battery would no longer give me the trouble it was giving me.

That solved the problem for a few months. However, last month the car would not start. The battery was entirely drained. Auto Pro took my car to run some diagnostic tests. They looked online to try to figure out if others were having the problem.

They found that Subaru FINALLY admitted the problem. Their recommendation was to replace the battery with a higher voltage battery. That is what Auto Pro did. I now have my car back and I start it everyday for about 10 minutes just to make sure, even though I should not have to do that. Other car owners do not. Their cars sit out in all kinds of weather. My car is garage kept.

The bottom line is that this is a problem that affected more than just a handful of people. It is affecting 10s of thousands of Subaru owners. The fact that Subaru only now has admitted there is a problem and provided a part number for the exchange of the battery is very sad. How many of us have had to purchase battery after battery and pay for any other service done to the car and Subaru knew this was an issue. I am fortunate to have Auto Pro take care of me whenever I need them. God blessed me with Alex the owner!!

Well, I thought I'd share this little bit of information and hope it helps you to solve someone else's problem with the Subaru.

Rome, Italy, is one of the biggest magnets for tourists worldwide due to its historical sites, magnificent ruins and delicious cuisine. Known for its breathtaking landmarks, such as the Sistine Chapel, the Colosseum and the Trevi Fountain, there's something for everyone to enjoy during their vacation to Rome. We've curated a list of the top best things to do in Rome that every visitor should put in their travel itinerary.

Hike Through the Villa Borghese Gardens

Reservations required: Yes

Time needed: 2 hours

Part of the Villa Borghese complex, the gardens offer an incredible respite from busy Roman streets. The garden, open from dawn to dusk, covers nearly 200 acres and includes the Borghese and Pietro Canonica art museums, cafes and restaurants. Another point of interest within the Villa Borghese Gardens is the Casino della Meridiana (Meridiana Pavilion), recognizable from its marble and stucco adornments.

Explore the Galleria Borghese

Reservations required: Yes

Time needed: 2 hours

Part of the Villa Borghese, the Galleria Borghese is an art museum that houses numerous exquisite paintings, sculptures and antiques. The structure was constructed in the 17th century and is in the northern part of the inner city. It is an attractive building with a lovely façade decorated with stone statues.


Within the museum are 20 different rooms that feature works by Raphael, Caravaggio, Rubens and Titian, among others. Give yourself ample time to see this impressive masterpiece and the magnificent Villa Borghese Gardens.

Stroll Through the Roman Forum

Reservations required: No, but recommended

Time needed: 2-3 hours

The Roman Forum is an ancient site that once served as the center of Roman public and political life. There were several temples, squares and archways, many of which still



stand today, including the Temple of Saturn, the Temple of Vesta, the Arch of Septimus Severus and the Arch of Titus.

The Roman Forum is situated close to the Colosseum and the Altar of the Fatherlands and is practically a required stop for first-time visitors to Rome. Tip: Plan to visit the Roman Forum, the Colosseum and Palatine Hill on the same day. They are close together, and tours typically include all three.

Tour the Colosseum

Reservations required: No, but recommended Time needed: 2-3 hours

The Colosseum, one of the most recognizable landmarks in Rome, is a historically significant structure from ancient Rome. The amphitheater was constructed between A.D. 70 and 80 and could hold 50,000 spectators. Emperors staged gladiator competitions, chariot races and, surprisingly, mock naval battles. The Colosseum is easily accessible from the Colosseo metro stop, about a 5-minute walk.

Walk to the Palatine Hill

Reservations required: Yes

Time needed: 3 hours

Palatine Hill is the location where, according to Roman legend, twins Romulus and Remus were found as infants by a shepherd and are said to have later built the city of Rome. Today, the hill reaches about 130 feet above the city, and the ruins include Domus Flavia (Flavian Palace) and the Temple of Cybele.

Note: Be sure to put on your walking shoes before climbing to the top of this ancient landmark.

View the Vittoriano (Altar of the Fatherland)

Reservations required: No, but recommended

Time needed: 1-2 hours

Another monumental building, located in the center of Rome, is Vittoriano, named for Victor Emmanuel II, the first king of unified Italy. Unlike many of the notable landmarks in Rome, this one is comparatively modern. Construction began in the late 19th century, and the monument opened to the public in 1911.

The memorial features a massive bronze statue of Emmanuel and several other stone sculptures. The façade has an elegant columnar pattern, and the museum within the center of the monument focuses on Italy's unification and its historical beginnings.

Vittoriano is located between the Pantheon and the Colosseum, about a 15-minute walk to either.

Tour the Quirinal Palace

Reservations required: Yes

Time needed: 1-2 hours

The stately building and complex is an official residence of the Italian president and is located on Quirinal Hill. The 270-acre complex is a massive palace with 1,200 rooms. The rooms are richly furnished, and courtyards and staircases add to the opulence.

During a tour, you can see numerous exhibits detailing the palace's history and uses. The Quirinal Gardens have several flowers and fountains, trees, hedges and works of art that seem to be tucked away in every spot of the gar-

Explore the Piazza Navona

Reservations required: No

Time needed: 1-2 hours

Built on the ruins of the Stadium of Domitian, the Piazza Navona dates back to the 15th century and remains one of the more popular sights in Rome. Generally, artists and vendors fill the piazza, and the surrounding buildings frame the open space perfectly.

Notable parts of the square are The Fontana del Moro (Moor Fountain), Fontana del Nettuno (Neptune Fountain), the Palazzo Braschi, Palazzo Pamphilj and the Church of Sant'Agnese in Agone.

Eat at Trastevere

Reservations required: Depending on the restaurant Time needed: 2-3 hours

Once a walled city in the Middle Ages, Trastevere features narrow cobblestone streets, which wind between buildings of this neighborhood. Some consider Trastevere one of the few places to experience authentic Roman life, even though the neighborhood has grown in popularity with tourists for the last several years.

While strolling through the neighborhood, you can see ivy growing on the buildings and feel enmeshed in the culture. Grab a drink or a bite to eat at any of the many cafes and pubs. If you want to go bar hopping while in Rome, Trastevere is a popular nightlife spot.

Visit the Pantheon

Reservations required: Yes

Time needed: 1 hour

The Pantheon, one of the best-preserved historic Roman buildings, is an iconic attraction in Rome. Roman statesman and architect Marcus Agrippa ordered the construction of the building in 27 B.C., and the Pantheon was rebuilt under the rule of the emperor Hadrian between A.D. 118 and 128.

The entrance to the round building is a rectangular porch adorned with large columns and a triangular pediment inscribed with Agrippa's name. Besides the magnificent dome, statues and marble walls decorate the interior, and it appears much as it did in the time of Hadrian.

Note: The Pantheon is also the Basilica di Santa Maria ad Matyres. It is free to enter, but reservations are required on Saturday, Sunday and public holidays.

Visit the Capitoline Museums

Reservations required: No, but recommended Time needed: 2 hours

The Capitoline Museums, located on top of the Capitoline Hill, are another opportunity to learn more about Roman heritage and beautiful art. Established in 1471 by Pope Sixtus IV and opened to the public in 1734, the Capitoline Museums are one of the oldest public museums you can visit. View magnificent sculptures, paintings and ancient Roman objects among the museum's exhibits. You can also enjoy a beautiful view of the city from the museum's terrace.

Shop at Campo de' Fiori

Reservations required: No

Time needed: 2-3 hours

Campo de' Fiori, translating to "Field of Flowers," is another market square that's popular amongst visitors and residents. Enjoy one of the city's largest outdoor food markets, where you can enjoy fresh produce and beautiful flowers—hence the name. During the evening, enjoy a meal or drinks at one of the area's restaurants and cafes while fully immersing yourself in the quintessential Roman neighborhood.

Road trips and outdoor destinations are a natural fit if you're looking for a vacation that allows family bonding or social distancing. Camping is a fun, budget-friendly way to enjoy a getaway in the great outdoors. However, it does take some planning and preparation. If you've never tried camping before, these tips will help make your first time a success.

Camping covers a broad spectrum of experiences, from primitive camping with a small personal tent to parking a luxury RV in a campground with its own restaurant and swimming pool. If you're new to camping, tent camping in a campground is a great way to get started, as it doesn't require a large investment and your family can enjoy fun camping activities such as roasting marshmallows and sleeping in a tent while still having access to restrooms, showers and other amenities. Some campgrounds even offer extra features and activities for kids, such as the ones chosen by AAA inspectors as their top picks for "Coolest Campgrounds for Families1." If pitching your own tent

sounds intimidating, consider renting an RV or a safari tent at a "glamping" property, which will allow you to try out an outdoorsy vacation without having to invest in camping gear.

Where Should I Go Camping?

While it's tempting to set your sights on a spectacular, nationally known park or wilderness area, for your first camping trip it's a good idea to find a campground closer to home, or at least one within easy driving distance of a city. That way, you can easily head into town if you realize you forgot to pack something you need, an unexpectedly severe storm makes tent camping uncomfortable, there's an emergency, or you (or one of the kids) suddenly decide camping is not your cup of tea.

It's easy to find nearby national forests and parks with the National Parks search feature in AAA's TripTik® Travel Planner². Enter a state in the search box and select a national public land from the drop-down menu. You'll be taken to a map of the area that shows features of the park, scenic drives and nearby attractions. Click on the camping icon in the toolbar to see AAA Approved campgrounds in the area.

You can also search for pre-planned, scenic Road Trips in TripTik Travel Planner or at AAA.com/RoadTrips, then locate campgrounds and attractions along the route.

Be sure to involve the kids. Involving the entire family in planning your camping adventure ensures a personalized experience that caters to everyone's comfort level and interests. Prompting them to think about enjoyable activities such as swimming, hiking, canoe riding, or even making s'mores can heighten their excitement

for the trip. Remember, the meaning of camping varies for different people, so thinking about the possibilities will get them excited about the trip.

Once you've decided on a destination and chosen your desired campground, reserve a campsite as soon as possible, especially if you're traveling during the busy summer months.

Consider campsite preferences when making your reservation, such as location of the campsite—do you need to be near restrooms? Close to or away from a shoreline or swimming pool? If the campsite allows both tents and RVs, find out if there are areas designated for tent campers only so there's less chance of being disturbed by an RV generator running at night.

Small Acts of Kindness to Help Heal a Community

Jeanette Kingsbury and her team at Action Wrecker Service. Inc. in Midland, TX had been the dedicated towing provider for the local police department for some time. This typically meant helping clear crash scenes, towing abandoned vehicles and other similar activities. But, one tragic and unforgettable day, a mass shooting occurred in the region, where a single gunman targeted innocent drivers on Midland's highways. For their actions to assist in this instance. Action Wrecker Services is a AAA Real Hero of the Road.

On this tragic day, it was their job to tow the vehicles of the shooting victims from the scene. Jeanette says she was in awe of her drivers and her office staff, who are always professional and courteous, but on this day, they went above and beyond. Since they had these vehicles in their possession, they had to



notify the families of the victims that they had their vehicle. She said her staff handled each outreach with tremendous care and compassion.

One family in particular stood out who wanted to keep their loved one's truck since it was his prized possession. In the aftermath of what had happened, it held great senti-

mental value and they felt it would give them closure to have it. Jeanette knew the family could not see the truck in its current shape so they made sure it was clean before returning it to them.

Jeanette and her staff were deeply affected by the tragedy and also wanted to help an officer who had been wounded in the standoff. Her staff, along with the owner and general manager, worked tirelessly for weeks to refurbish a vintage vehicle to present to the officer.

When Jeanette thinks back to those days and weeks following the shooting, she says, "I have never known a group of people that are as kind, generous, caring and professional as the people I am privileged to call my Action Wrecker family. I pray every family affected that day is in a place of healing and grace and that they know we are always here if you need us."

Heading Home for the Holidays

A young woman headed to surprise her family for Christmas ended up stranded with a flat tire. It was late and as Dennis Lee Richards of Riverside Auto & Towing, Longbottom, OH, arrived on scene, he could see the member was quite scared and upset. Since she did not have a spare tire, he knew he would have to tow her car to his shop.

Before loading up her vehicle, Dennis called his wife and they both agreed he would bring her to their home so she had a place to wait while he repaired her tire.

Once Dennis got her car to his shop and had a chance to get a better look, he realized the tire could not be fixed. Usually he doesn't keep tires in stock but it just so happened he had two tires on hand that fit her car. After changing both front tires,

Dennis went to his home where she was waiting and offered the new tires as a Christmas present. He only asked that she first call her parents and let them know she was traveling.



Before the young woman left,
Dennis's wife packed up some
snacks for the road and told her
where she could stop along her
route to rest safely. As she turned to
leave, Dennis saw that she had tears
in her eyes. When telling this story,
Dennis says, "I know we gave her
tires but it seems like her visit was a
gift to us that night. She told my wife
the reason she called us was
because her grandmother had told
her that if she was ever stranded to
always call AAA because she would
find people she could trust."

Jeanette and her staff are Real Heroes of the Road to the families and their community that suffered such a horrific day. Dennis was a Real Hero of the Road to that young woman who was just trying to get home to her family for the holidays.

When you're driving along the highway and see Jeanette or Dennis or someone else working at the roadside, think of these stories and what their selflessness meant to those drivers. And when you do, please slow down and move over so they can do their job safely. We need service providers like Jeanette and Dennis and so do our members; but most of all, so do their families. Help us keep them safe.

Flying With Children

Looking forward the next family vacation but dreading the air travel to get there? Keeping even the calmest child entertained in a small space for hours at a time can be daunting. Here are some tips from AAA and the FAA on how to keep your kids happy and safe from ticket counter to touchdown.

Turn practice into play.

Kids need a sense of safety. Talking to your kids ahead of time about what will happen at the airport and on the plane is helpful. You might even act out the adventure by setting up some furniture to resemble a TSA checkpoint and play-act the process. Let them know what they will or will not be allowed to do on the plane/in the airport so they understand what is expected of them.

Consider buying infants and toddlers their own seat.

Most major domestic airlines allow kids under the age of two years to fly for free as a lap child. Seriously though, how many of you who are parents of a child old enough to crawl or walk can imagine trying to keep that child on your lap the whole trip? Children may be less restless in an FAA-approved seat designed specifically for their bodies (look for the FAA-approved label on your

car seat). You can find great tips about using child safety seats on aircraft - including how to install them - at faa.gov/travelers/fly children.

Give yourself an extra hour.

Get to the airport early to allow for extra time to get through security with your stroller, carrier and any baby food. All liquids need to be removed from your bag during screening. Find out what baby items are allowed in aircraft at tsa.gov/travel/tsa-cares/traveling-children. If there's still time, allow your toddler to blow off excited energy before boarding.

Divide and conquer.

If traveling with another adult, one of you can board early to stow away all of your extra gear while the other gets some final wiggles out of your little one.

Have a plan for tantrums.

This starts with a well-rested, well-fed toddler. Tantrum flare while in the air? Try distracting/redirecting your child with snacks, activity books, or quiet toys. In worst-case tantrum scenarios it is still important to obey flight safety rules like keeping the seat belt on/staying secured in the child safety seat. Safety is never negotiable.



On The Road

High Cost of ADAS Repair Following a Crash

A recent study by AAA found that advanced driver assistance systems (ADAS), like automatic emergency braking, blind spot monitoring, and lane departure warning, can add up to 37.6% to the total repair cost after a crash. This is due to the high cost of replacing and calibrating the sensors that operate these systems.

Even minor damage to systems such as front radar or distance sensors can result in additional repair expenses of up to \$1,540. AAA advises consumers to 1) be aware of the repair costs associated with these vehicle systems and 2) prioritize repairing them when necessary to ensure they work as intended.

"Vehicles equipped with more sophisticated safety systems are much more common now, especially since NHTSA proposed its rule requiring automatic emergency braking last year," said Greg Brannon, AAA's director of automotive engineering. "Consumers should know about the repair costs associated with these technologies. But they must also understand the importance of fixing them since improperly functioning systems could result in a deadly crash."

Many variables can affect the cost of repairing ADAS, including vehicle make and model, the type and location of the sensor and the type of facility where the repair work is performed. Consumers may not realize it, but the sensors that help ADAS "see" the world around the vehicle are located at the front, side and back. AAA looked at four repair scenarios (front-end collision, side mirror replacement, rear collision and windshield replacement) to

understand the costs of repairing these sensors.

The highest repair cost for ADAS components is attributed to radar sensors and cameras damaged in a front-end collision. However, the replacement of a side mirror represented the largest proportion of repair costs of the three scenarios.

For the three vehicles (model year 2023) evaluated in this report, AAA found that:

- The average cost of replacing ADAS components in a minor front collision repair was \$1,540, or 13.2% of the average total repair.
- · An average of 70.8% of the repair cost (\$1,067) was attributable to the ADAS camera included in the side mirror assembly.
- The average cost of replacing ADAS components in a minor rear collision repair was \$684, or 40.9% of the average total repair estimate of \$1,698.
- The cost of windshield glass replacement attributable to ADAS components averaged 25.4% (\$360.00) of the total repair cost.

Individual ADAS component costs (part and specific labor/calibration) over the four repair scenarios range from a low of \$290 to a high of \$1,596. AAA's research determined the ranges listed below for typical ADAS repair expenses. Note that these numbers are for costs over and above the normal bodywork required following a collision.

- · Front radar sensors used with automatic emergency braking and adaptive cruise control systems: \$500 to \$1,300.
- · Front camera sensors used with automatic emergency braking, adap-

tive cruise control, lane departure warning and lane keeping assistance (does not include the cost of a replacement windshield): \$600 - \$800.

- Mirror mount, side mirror used with around-view systems: \$740 -\$1.600.
- · Windshield camera sensor used with lane keeping assistance, traffic sign recognition and pedestrian detection: \$900 \$1,200.
- Front or rear ultrasonic sensors used with parking assist systems: \$300 \$1,000.

A driver is alerted by a warning light or icon on the instrument panel and/or a message display if an ADAS component is failing and causing the system to be inoperable. Once this occurs, it's crucial for drivers to take their vehicle to a reputable repair facility for repair.

For proper ADAS repair, it's vital to determine the location where the work is performed (dealership or independent) and that it be done competently, to the highest quality and accurately. Finding a reputable repair shop with professionally trained technicians to evaluate cost, quality, and standards guarantees a smoother repair experience. Look for the AAA Approved Auto Repair sign, as shops that display this logo have met AAA's high-quality standards.
